Set Yourself Up For Success	Possible outcomes:
Be ready to meet lots and lots of people Ask for a schedule of your time on-site Speak into the schedule as needed Allow for plenty of 'renew and refresh' time ON SITE	They love me, I love them They love me, I don't love them They don't love me, I love them A mutual feeling that this isn't the right fit Any of these are good outcomes because they provide clarity.
Gather as much information as possible. Some of your clarity will come more as observations of your time there rather than the questions you ask; but you'll want to ask as many questions (to as many people) as possible.	AFTER THE INTERVIEW Thank them for the opportunity and give them an update on how you felt the on-site visit went.
 What do the questions they're asking you tell you about their values? How much past conflict has the church endured? How do you compare to the last person that held the position? What are they postponing until you arrive? What is the existing leadership structure and where do you fit?
